## Radio Battles Storm

**T**HE police radio equipment proved its great value again in the violent gale which swept portions of the city Thursday. Roofs were ripped off, trees uprooted, wires blown down, fires started and street car traffic demoralized.

The windstorm lasted only six minutes, but before it ended every radio-equipped police car had been sent to the scene of some accident or to some place damaged by the storm.

The operators sitting at the microphone in Station X were like generals in a dugout back of a battle firing line. As rapidly as telephone calls came in—and they came in a flood—the police shock troops were dispatched by wireless orders directly to the points where they were most needed.

It was a magnificent demonstration of the mobility which the radio has given Cincinnati's police force.
